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Cutting-Edge Medicine Wasted: New Survey Uncovers Devastating Inequities in Glioblastoma Care

A new nationwide survey reveals that high-tech, life-extending treatments for glioblastoma (GBM)—the deadliest brain cancer—are failing to reach the people who need them most. While science pushes forward with genomic breakthroughs and personalized care, too many patients are left behind due to income, education, and geography.

The survey—led by the nonprofit OurBrainBank with doctors from Duke, Columbia, and Dana-Farber—will be presented at the 2025 ASCO[®] Annual Meeting in Chicago.

"Our findings are alarming," said Kelli Duprey, Executive Director of OurBrainBank. "We're in a golden age of cancer research—but these tools are useless if people can't access them."
